- Protected more than 125 miles of waterways

In 2023:

- 13 new project areas totaling over 8,700 acres of protected lands
- Partnership events that help deepen our community's connection to nature
- Increased connectivity between protected, natural spaces in the Spokane region
- More inclusive events for all skill levels and abilities

Recent projects:

- **Drewes Farm on South Hill:** 14 acres adjacent to a future YMCA facility. This land is intended for wetland restoration and the eventual creation of a community space with trails, intact ecosystems, and educational opportunities about our local natural environment.
- **Camp Stidwell:** Kiwanis Camp near Lake Pend Oreille is protected by a legal agreement ensuring that it will forever be protected from development. Thousands of young people use the camp every year to come in contact with and learn about nature.
- **Andrews Farm:** Historic farmland near Fernan Lake is protected by a legal agreement, according to the matriarch's wishes when she passed away. Before her children sold the land, a generous donor covered the stewardship costs through his required minimum distribution, allowing for its permanent protection. The new owners are delighted with their home and know that it will forever be a safe haven for plants and wildlife thanks to this protection.
- **Rimrock to Riverside:** One hundred and twenty acres of land between Palisades Park and Riverside State Park has been permanently protected and, in 2022, transferred to the ownership and management of City Parks through the County Conservation Futures program. INLC worked with conservation angels, the local community, and private philanthropists to purchase and protect this land forever, creating an 11-mile wildlife corridor. The community will also have access to this space, contiguous with Palisades Park and someday to be seamlessly connected with Riverside with a bridge over the BNSF railroad.
